### 1. I do my homework

Hago mi tarea.

### 2. I put my books in my backpack.

Pongo mis libros en mi mochila.

### 3. I bring my books to school.

Traigo mis libros al colegio.

The verbs above can be called -go verbs because they end in -go.

<b>Sé</b>	Sabemos	<b>Veo</b>	Vemos	<b>Salgo</b>	Salimos
Sabes	Sabéis	Ves	Veis	Sales	Salís
Sabe	Saben	Ve	Ven	Sale	Salen

### Notes:

“**saber**” + **de** (about / of) is used to say how much someone knows about something.

Ex: Miguel sabe mucho de arte = Miguel knows a lot about art.

“**salir**” + **de** (from) is used to talk about leaving a place.

Ex: Julio sale de su colegio a las tres.

### 1. I know a lot about chemistry.

Sé mucho de arte.

### 2. I leave (from) my house at 7 in the morning.

Salgo de mi casa a las 7 de la mañana.
